

Legends of the Buddhist Saints

Apadānapāli

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[248. Pāṭalipūjaka¹]

Back then I placed upon my head
seven trumpet-flower² blossoms;
I offered [them] to the Buddha,
Vessabhu, Supreme among Men. (1) [2488]

In the thirty-one aeons since
I did *pūjā* [with] that flower,
I've come to know no bad rebirth:
that's the fruit of flower-*pūjā*. (2) [2489]

The four analytical modes,
and these eight deliverances,
six special knowledges mastered,
[I have] done what the Buddha taught! (3) [2490]

Thus indeed Venerable Pāṭalipūjaka Thera spoke these verses.

²*pāṭali* is Sinh. *paḷol*, *Bignonia suaveolens*, *sterospermum suaveolens* (*Bignon.*), trumpet-flower tree, the Bodhi Tree of Vipassī Buddha. Cf. #71, #78, #96, #255, #369{372}.
