

Legends of the Buddhist Saints

Apadānapāli

TRANSLATED BY
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Kumudamāliya

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[320. Kumudamāliya¹]

Taking a white lotus bloom I
laid it [before] the Best Buddha,
Sacrificial Recipient,
the Bull, Excellent One, Hero,
Victorious One, the Great Sage,
Vipassi [Buddha], Great Hero,
like a lion which is well-born. (1-2) [2821-2822]

In the ninety-one aeons since
I did *pūjā* [with] that flower,
I've come to know no bad rebirth:
that's the fruit of Buddha-*pūjā*. (3) [2823]

The four analytical modes,
and these eight deliverances,
six special knowledges mastered,
[I have] done what the Buddha taught! (4) [2824]

Thus indeed Venerable Kumudamāliya Thera spoke these verses.

The legend of Kumudamāliya Thera is finished.

Arakkhada, Bhojanada,
Gatasaññi and Padumika,
Pupphāsani, Santhavaka,
Saddasaññi, Tirāṇsiya,
Kandali and Komudi too:
there are fifty-seven verses.
